BABY FEEDING

Mothers Making a Difference:

Mothers and parents in our centres of Rejaf, Lologo and Nyarjwa derive from low income population, though they are trying their best in providing the necessary basic needs, primarily food. However, most of the children living with single parents in these areas are suffering from acute shortages of nutritious elements in food composition, which causes weight loss and weakens children immunity.

As part of this project, mothers learn vital feeding practices that transform outcomes for their babies. They become agents of change, spreading knowledge and care.

Research and Reality

There are facts based on our community's survey that are related to daily cost for an ordinary vegetable's meal for the families with less income of about \$3. This cost is unaffordable to the vast majority of families living in our targeted areas of project's execution. As a result, most children are dropping out of school and resort to street life where they are subjected to all sorts of abuses and exploitation. With 7.7 million people faced with severe food insecurity, 2.3 million children face acute malnutrition in the country.

Our Feeding Program: Nourishing Hope

In the midst of this crisis, our feeding program for malnourished babies in South Sudan is a beacon of hope. With your support, we are providing life-saving nutrition to infants who desperately need it. Through carefully designed feeding interventions using locally sourced, nutrient-rich foods like fortified porridge and therapeutic supplements, we are:

- **Saving lives:** Giving malnourished babies a fighting chance against the odds.
- **Restoring health:** Helping infants regain strength, grow healthy, and meet developmental milestones.
- **Empowering communities:** Working with mothers and caregivers to ensure sustainable practices for long-term impact.
